



Deacon's Report

This last year has, from my perspective, been a positive one where The Crossing Church congregation has knitted still closer together, engaged in community events and deepened in its discipleship collectively and individually.

The Visionaries group has discerned the way forward, beginning events and opportunities for children and families in a prayerful and care-full way, not diving in unprepared but taking each step at a time. Encouragingly we have started to get young families coming sporadically to worship services, and we have sought to make them feel a tangible sense of welcome and belonging, in part through the purchase of a children's trolley with toys, books and games which is available in the new children's area each Sunday.

The Crossing, for the first time, hosted a stall at July 2023's PRIDE event, leading to helpful conversations and a few expressions of interest in our events and the fact that we offer same-sex marriage services. Following that three people came to the newly re-launched Café Church service the following day. I am deeply encouraged by the Visionaries assertion that we are called to take the love of God into the community, not simply expecting folks to come to us. On the back of the successful PRIDE stall, we have been invited to provide similar at Worksop's Charter Day in October this year, and for subsequent events. We are gaining a reputation for openness and inclusion.

The first Family Film Night saw 12 people welcomed for the first time into the Café space for craft activities, pizza and Disney's 'Encanto'. There is much enthusiasm to continue these events with increased publicity through schools.

Our involvement with Priory Primary School has deepened over this year, with us hosting their Christmas Concert, and they have booked again for this year. I take monthly assemblies, and for the first time organised an 'Experience Easter' event in school which saw the entire school over the course of a day engage with the complexities of the Easter story, and respond with interactive prayer activities. The school was extremely positive about the event, and would welcome further input.

Relationships with the uniformed organisations who meet at The Crossing have continued to flourish, with Brownies and Scouts receiving their Faith Badges, and celebrating a Christingle service in the lead up to Christmas last year (I look forward to the same this year).

On a sadder note, we have hosted several funerals through the last year, including four of our own beloved members – Griff Wynne, Nigel Westerby, David Jordan and Brenda Belfiore. We continue to hold their loved ones in prayer.

We have also celebrated numerous baptisms this year with a truly lovely atmosphere and new family contacts made, and conducted the wedding of Michelle and David May, which was a real joy.

Thanks to your prayers and ongoing support we continue to be a presence for good in the local community, which I aim to spread still further over the coming year. Thank you so much to everyone who works so hard to make all of the above possible – you are much appreciated. In addition, you as a church family have enabled me to proceed to Ordination this year, and supported me and Lisa in spectacular fashion – thank you, so much. It is a privilege to serve alongside you. *Emily Hoe-Crook.*

Environmentally Friendly Church

At The Crossing Church we are working hard to increase our "Eco-Friendly" activities.

In the official accreditation system, we have achieved a Bronze certificate and we are working towards a Silver.

We have a number of collection points for items that can be recycled or re-used.

- Used plastic Milk Bottle tops (container in cafe kitchen) are collected and passed on to raise funds for Yorkshire Cancer Research. (via Sylvia)
- Used Glasses (container behind welcome desk) are collected to be re-used by the "Vision Aid Overseas" scheme via a local opticians.
- Toothpaste tubes & brushes (container behind welcome desk) are recycled via the Terracycle scheme.
- Empty Crisp packets (container behind welcome desk) These used to be recycled via the Terracycle scheme, but as most of our local supermarkets now have a collection point we encourage everyone to take these directly. We do however still provide the service for anyone who does not have transport.

Pastoral Support Team (previously Pastoral Visitors)

Since the last AGM Report we have had 4 members join our Church. Sadly, Griff Wynne, Nigel Westerby, David Jordan and Brenda Belfiore have passed away since the last AGM Report. Griff and David played a major part in the life of The Crossing Church, prior to and since its opening in May 2006. Nigel was also an active member of the church being the Company Secretary of the SEC and subsequently a member of the Church Council. Brenda Belfiore was also a longstanding member of The Crossing Church, although she had been unable to attend for some time, due to ill health. Our thoughts and prayers are with all of

their families at this time of loss, they will be sadly missed.

At the beginning of this year Mollie informed our meeting that she had made the decision to resign as a Pastoral Visitor. We thank Mollie for her many years of loyal service in this role – being a non-driver, this has often included lots of walking for her. She has also said that she will continue to support our team in prayer.

We still meet as a Pastoral Team of 7, on a regular basis and we thank Emily for her active involvement and for Chairing our meetings. At our last meeting, taking into account how the role of Pastoral Visitor has developed, it was felt we should change our title from Pastoral Visitors to Pastoral Support Team as this seems to better reflect our role. As a Pastoral Support Team we will continue to provide Pastoral Support to our Membership. We continue to thank Emily for her time and willingness to do hospital and home visits as the need arises.

On Sunday 1st October, Emily will be leading our Harvest Festival Service and during that service there will be a rededication of the Pastoral Support Team.

Worship Group

When Jean Roberts was at the helm she would organise us by setting a date for a planning meeting and then allocating roles for various willing folk to play in producing an act of worship for the designated Sunday but of late the pattern of services has varied and the 'Café Church' group is doing a fine job planning and delivering some new expressions of worship.

There are still some 'Own Arrangement' services being planned from time-to-time and if required the Worship Group will be reconvened as required.

Safeguarding report

This has been a very busy year for safeguarding paperwork, which I am slowly ploughing my way through.

A new handbook for safeguarding officers came out this year and I have begun reading it - slowly. We are now working to the two-year plan as set out in the Handbook.

After discussion with Alison Hill (District Safeguarding Officer) in February, it was decided that I needed help as there was so much paperwork to cover – especially in a Church such as ours. After discussion with Deacon Emily, it was decided that she would take over the reporting of any incidents and I would continue as Safeguarding Officer. Emily is responsible for chapter 2 in the handbook and I am responsible for Chapter 1, 3,4,5,6,7.

Alison and I worked on creating a safeguarding spreadsheet unique to our Church groups. This Safeguarding Risk Assessment form was sent out to all church-based groups. Thank you to all who filled in the spreadsheet and returned it. Only one group has yet to fill in a risk assessment. These have been filed on the Church SharePoint. Any safeguarding issues that arose from the risk assessments have, hopefully, now been covered especially register taking!!

I have nearly finished the role descriptions for all volunteers in Church roles and many volunteers, especially on the Welcome desk have been issued with badges. These badges should be worn at all times especially when fulfilling the role e.g. Steward, Welcome desk volunteer etc. Both the role descriptions and badges should be completed by the end of the year.

The other job for this year is to complete Annual reviews for all those working on the welcome desk. This entails meeting individually with Welcome desk volunteers and filling in the relevant forms. Individual role descriptions are then completed and signed.

DBS checks are renewed every five years. All those due for review this year are currently being actioned.

We have had 2 safeguarding incidents this year which were both dealt with inhouse through mediation and counselling.

<u>Staffing</u>

The Crossing Church is registered as an employer with HMRC and employs three staff, these are :

- Garry Pritchard part time caretaker (17hrs per week)
- Barry Williamson part time cleaning operative (17 hrs per week)
- Laura Mazlum part time reception & admin support.(20 hrs per week) Our policy is to be a living wage employer.

These staff provide valuable support to our volunteer teams, and enable us to provide a professional service to the organisations who hire our rooms.

We are also heavily supported by the Trinity Methodist Circuit.

The Circuit Operations Manager, Richard Dearden takes the responsibility of line managing our staff and supporting our church council in many ways, particularly with regard to supervising property maintenance and day to day operations.

Singing with Dementia

This has been an encouraging year in many ways. Our numbers have picked up again after Covid and we have a steady number of 25 to 30 members

attending our events, mainly due to the loyal support of the Activities co-ordinators at Victoria and Greenacres Care homes.

Because of our Community Commitment evidence we are very proud to have been recognised as a Dementia Friendly Church by the Alzheimers Society.

Our entertainers have varied from the usual support of Annie Fotheringham, Russ Weaver, Denise and Roger Marsden and our friends from the U3a to an appearance by Elvis and a special afternoon with Alison Carrington

from our own congregation.

We held a Christmas Party at the end of November and were fortunate to gain a grant from The Foresters Friendly Society to fund this, thanks to Sylvia Heathcote. The highlight of the year was the Coronation Special. The room was packed with people singing patriotic songs whilst wearing crowns, tiaras, face masks and other appropriate dress. It was very emotional at the close when everyone who was able stood to sing God Save the King and wave their flags.

My thanks go once more to ALL the team without whom these events would not be possible. We were all very upset when Linda Lees, our Tombola Queen, reluctantly had to retire from her labours.

Linda you are wonderful and we are all very grateful to you for all your work and the enormous amount of money you raised. We love you and we miss you. Thank you to Iris Franks who has taken over so willingly.


After a short Summer break we meet again on September 20th. Due to various circumstances the dates between September and Christmas have been changed so please do check before attending.

Grumpy Men's Group

The Grumpy Men's Group was started by our much-missed Griff several years ago and both in tribute to Griff and also because we all seem to enjoy this group we are continuing to meet in much the same way as it has always been.

This is one of those groups which have no agenda, programme or membership requirements save for the fact that all participants qualify as being 'Grumpy Men', according to others!

We meet on the second Wednesday of each month at 12.30pm and enjoy our regular diet of butties, chips and coffee (or tea). The butties comprise a bap (or bread-cake or plain teacake or whatever you wish to call it), either white or brown, with a filling of either sausage or bacon. These are lovingly prepared by a team comprising Russell, Janet, Christine, Iris or anyone else we can commandeer into this valuable and fulfilling role. Chips are purchased from 'Catch 44' along Newcastle Avenue and this monthly diet successfully shuts us up for about ten minutes after which the conversation can vary from local issues, international politics, finances, aches and pains, bin lorries, mining engineering, council business or even buses and trains! The subject matter is not pre-planned but just evolves.

The monthly gathering usually lasts for about an hour and a bit and the attendance has reached 13 or 14 at times and we fit neatly into the café space around the comfy chairs.

It is a fun group and is very therapeutic and tummy enhancing. If you are tempted to come along and if you qualify as a 'Grumpy Man' then you will be very welcome – so long as you don't take things too seriously. There is naturally a charge for these fine refreshments which is around the $\pounds 6$ or $\pounds 7$ mark and any profit made is added to Crossing funds.

Art Group

Model Transport Exhibition

We have now held six Model Transport Exhibitions at The Crossing and even through the years of Covid restrictions we managed to continue the pattern though we changed the time of year from January to September and this has been much appreciated by helpers and exhibitors alike though the 2023 event hit what felt like the hottest day of the year, but thanks to regular supplies of water and airconditioning units, we coped and had another successful event.

I have to confess that I really enjoy these events as it gives an opportunity for those of us who are afflicted with enthusiasm for model transport in its many forms to see them on display and though my personal version of this affliction relates to buses, trams, trolleybuses and trains I still find the miniaturisation of transport in their context captures my imagination and that of countless others as can be seen from the faces of those who come along to these popular events.

Once one exhibition has taken place Russell and I try to get along to the other local exhibitions to see if there are any layouts and dioramas which would fit into the space we have at The Crossing and we try to assemble a variety of styles of layout with varying scales and eras they depict but we are often constrained by the availability of the exhibits and exhibitors and the expense of them being brought along to Worksop for one-day events (many model railway exhibitions are two-day weekend events).

As many of you are aware I have been involved with the Model Bus Federation since 1968 and we regularly have members support our events at The Crossing from as far afield as South Shields, Bishop Auckland, Stafford, Harrogate, Nottingham, Huddersfield and Dewsbury but this year we had visitors from much further afield including a member normally resident in Australia but who made Worksop part of his UK itinerary on his recent six-week visit.

But these exhibitions only happen because of the amazing support we get by lots of volunteers many of whom are church members but also friends who also help

in many ways.

These volunteers include those who work hard in the café, making cakes and sandwiches, serving them, and who present a smiling face to the customers. There are those who staff the paydesk, who look after the car parking for exhibitors and who operate the car park barrier (in all weather). There are many who help move the church furniture to create the space required, and then put it all



back again. There are those who distribute posters and fliers and who ensure local shops and other churches are aware of the exhibition, and there are many others whose help is invaluable and much appreciated, and then there are those who come along on the day and willing pay to be entertained, well refreshed, and who go away and tell everyone else what they have enjoyed.

Based on the success of these annual events and the good support of local enthusiasts, families and other visitors, we will have two such events in 2024, one in March and the other in September. Thanks you for your support.

Music at The Crossing

Although Music @ The Crossing does not exist anymore after David's retirement from the role, we still have concerts, but now they are booked by the choirs or bands themselves. The Church Council decided, because of copyright laws, to limit the number of concerts we do to 6 a year.

In 2022/ 2023 we had 5 concerts. Ryton Chorale thrilled audiences with their November 2022 concert and then followed up with their annual Messiah concert in March 2023.

Anson Male Voice choir came in September 2022 and filled the hall. They returned in November 2022 along with the Major Oak Pop Choir. The Crossing was full of audience and choir members (65 in all)

In July this year Simply Swing – the U3A swing band – came and entertained us with an afternoon of music through the years. Tea and coffee were available and everyone thoroughly enjoyed the performance.

There are two concerts in line for the rest of this year – Musicality Singers will be bringing their Christmas Concert on Friday 15th December and, we hope that The Major Oak Pop Choir will return on Saturday 9th December - watch the window and magazine for more information nearer the date.

I would like to thank all the volunteers who come along to these concerts and help me to make the evenings enjoyable and to run smoothly. Without them there wouldn't be any concerts.

Church Fayres

It has become our regular pattern to hold two Fayres during the year, these were on 5th November 2022 & 20th May 2023. These were both really busy events, bringing many people into The Crossing, and raising much needed funds for the Church.

The stalls are usually a mix of local craftspeople bringing their wares for sale, our own church folk who have special talents and many "pre-loved" items looking for a new home, be they books, plants, jewellery, accessories, bric a brac etc.

Not forgetting homemade cakes & preserves, greetings cards, art work etc.

We also have a number of our groups raising funds for their own group (such as the Cubs and Scouts and Dementia Singing) and others raising funds for local charities (such as the MS Society)

These events are an ideal time for us to open our café once again, and provide refreshments for stallholders & attendees alike and although busy & tiring our fantastic team of catering volunteers all agree that it is lovely for the café to be

"buzzing" again, and filled with the smell of cooking pork (hot pork rolls) or bacon.

Our next event will be a Christmas Fayre on November 25th.

<u>Community Café</u>

Our Café space and kitchen has continued to be used for a variety of purposes throughout the year, some arranged by our own volunteer team and others by third parties and local charities.

The regular coffee morning from 10am – 12noon every Friday morning has become more & more popular and we have a number of regular customers who meet up every Friday. It is manned by a wonderful team of volunteers who serve on a rota basis. (we could always accommodate a few more people)

We serve Fairtrade Coffee & Tea and lots of lovely homemade cakes (made by a few dedicated volunteer cake bakers)

New volunteers are welcome, both to serve and or wash up, and to provide homemade cakes on a regular basis. If we have a few more people helping once a month, it would really help.

During this year we were contacted by the North Notts College Flex Team with a request to run a coffee morning on Wednesdays, with a start date in March this has gradually built in popularity, and is now getting busier.

This is a "Partnership project" with the church providing all the supplies (including homemade cakes) and the Staff & Students from North Notts College providing the volunteers.

This is a valuable training activity for students who have additional needs, giving them skills that they will be able to use in the workplace once they leave college.

So please come along & support your church by purchasing coffee & cakes on Wednesday & Friday mornings (both are 10am -12noon)

Our Community Café Team have also provided drinks stations & buffets on occasions during the year, these have been for organisations using our rooms for meetings, conferences, training events etc and occasionally for funeral teas.

The busiest days have been when we open the café for a full day in conjunction with our fundraising events (Church Fayres & Model transport day etc)

On these days we plan light lunches as well as our usual coffee morning menu, on these days we are very busy, and raise much needed funds for the ongoing work of the church. In November we decided to keep our café space open on Friday afternoons as part of the **"Warm Spaces"** initiative. This has developed in the spring to **"Friendship Afternoon Tea"** with a team of volunteers serving hot drinks & cakes/snacks/sandwiches. This is all on a donation only basis, as the main purpose is to provide safe space for anyone to attend, rather than a fundraising activity.

We say a particular "Thank-You" to the Foresters who provided us with a grant of £200 which enabled us to purchase some new equipment, Tea-pots, Toaster, Cake covers etc. and thanks to Sylvia for applying for this funding on our behalf.

Our Café space has also been used for many valuable projects during the year:-

- Every Tuesday Lunchtime we host the Methodist Homes for the Aged, older peoples lunch club. This is a very welcome and well attended regular event.
- BCVS & YMCA continued to organise a joint project around healthy eating and cookery lessons for the YMCA hostel users. This is a shorter project, usually in 6 week blocks and funding has been given.
- Every Thursday we host the Notts MIND Wellness Café.
- Also some of our regular groups who have submitted reports to this publication also use our café space , which was not really possible when the Café company was open.

Financial Report 2022-2023

The accounts for the year ended 31st August 2023 are ready to take to the accountants Williams Knowles & Co, for preparation and independent examination. Below is a copy of our Statement of Accounts and Sub Account Summary for Property.

There was a net deficit in the movement of funds as at the 31^{st} August 2022 of £21953. Please see the SOFA included within the accounts and reports prepared by William Knowles for 2020-21 (this includes depreciation for buildings).

There was a deficit of £996 as at the 31^{st} August 2022 (the difference between receipts and payments during 2021-22).

At the end of this financial year 31^{st} August 2023 (2022-23), the difference between receipts and payments is a surplus of £35301. The Crossing Church received a bequest of £39426.40 from the estate of Anne Kelly in July. This bequest will be transferred to TMCP (since it is more than £20000) but we will be able to draw funds from the trust when needed, during the next financial year. There is also £9687.64 restricted and designated funds held within the CAF cash account and CFB deposit account, included within this surplus.

Cash at bank as at 31.8.23 is £90916.14, this includes £9687.64 of designated and

restricted funds held within the CAF cash and CFB deposit accounts. This positive cash flow enables us to be solvent through to the end of the 2023-4 financial year. Receipts from lettings/rent/Acorn/community café invoices still do not cover property expenditure. The Church Council/Operations Manager and Methodist District continue to search for funding and ways to balance the budget and give long term security.

Within the cash held, there is money held for flowers/gardening/Singing with Dementia; a grant from Notts CC and money released from a TMCP fund which must be used for work with Youth and Children. The Church continues to be supported by the Model Bus Exhibition and its members; especially donations from the restoration of models sold Worldwide! Once again, The Church is incredibly grateful for all the many donations it has received from the congregation, members and Church groups including our Guiding groups. Thank you also for the continued support of Sunday offerings from members including those who pay by our preferred method of SO/Bank transfer.

The reserve account balance is now £14360.55. This includes a provision transferred from SEC funds for redundancies, since the Church now employs the caretakers and the receptionist.

Budget and Actual Comparisons for the year show that Congregational and Property income were greater than budget – rental income increased above budget and previous years actual figures. Ministry spend exceeded budget, this now includes receptionist costs and seated exercise costs which had not been budgeted for in the church budget. Property spend continues to be high but was less than budget, some property repairs were carried over to the next financial year. Electricity was still on a fixed rate until the end of the year (it has now increased dramatically as we start the new financial year). Please ask AW for a copy of the budget/actual comparison for a more detailed breakdown.

The Community Café has been successful financially. We must thank all the volunteers for their hard work, enabling the Church to provide a community café for the public on Fridays and Wednesdays; also, funeral teas, concert refreshments and refreshments for and after Church services.

The Flower fund balance at Bank is \pounds -22.03 and Cash \pounds 72.43. Thank you to those who have donated time and money to the flowers in Church.

If you have any questions / queries with regard to the accounts or require a further breakdown of specific areas, please do not hesitate to ask.

With God's help and our prayers, I hope that we can continue to move forward, so that we can improve our work in the Church and community in line with our mission. *Annette Westerby.*

Resources and Property Group

Background and Membership: The R&P group was formed in 2004, before the Crossing was completed and opened. The group acts on behalf of the Church Council in dealing with property based matters. Significant matters are reported to Church Council and decisions are requested from them where a strategic, sensitive or policy issue arises. The group has also made decisions relating to the recruitment and employment of caretaking posts which are direct employees of the Church. These matters are, of course, kept largely confidential.

In the last year membership has consisted of Rev. Julie Coates, Margaret Merrills, Richard Peake, Annette Westerby. Annette is a member on an ex-officio basis as Church Treasurer. Carl Andrews assists, bringing his valuable professional expertise, and Richard Dearden, Trinity Circuit Operations Manager, makes a significant contribution to the Crossing's property issues. There is a vacancy for a Property Secretary.

Finances: The R&P group operates within the several budget headings covering property and related matters. The group receives updates on the spending position relative to the budgets. Authority to spend outside the terms of an approved budget has to be obtained from Church Council.

<u>Significant events and decisions</u>: For much of this year the group has functioned without formal meetings, to avoid taking up the time of some busy people. Decisions have been taken via e-mail discussions. Recent issues have included damage to the rear fire exit (an attempted break-in), water leaking in on the east wing landing, the heating boilers and related systems and air handling units. Many aspects of the building are subject to regular inspection and maintenance with significant associated cost.

<u>Conclusion</u>: There is an ongoing process of balancing what we have to do and would like to do with the resources available. Over the years various 'blue sky' ideas have been discussed around what we would do if we could. How ever impossible many things seem now, we should not lose the vision which led to the building of the Crossing in the first place.

On behalf of the Resources and Property Group I should like to thank everybody involved with property, both employed staff and the many volunteers, who contribute in so many ways.

<u>Closure of The Crossing Social Enterprise Co. Ltd. (SEC)</u>

Following on from the decision, made last year by the SEC Board & the Church Trustees, to close the SEC and therefore simplify our governance structures the practical tasks were put into place during this financial year.

Interested parties have all been informed and the appropriate paperwork has been signed & sent to companies house & the charity commission to dissolve the SEC as both a company & a charity. The Company is now listed as dissolved via voluntary strike off, 3rd October 2023.

All accounts were finalized & closed with the final balances & responsibilities being passed to the Church.

The final accounts were for the period Sept 2021 to Jan 2023 (17 months) and are available for anyone who would like a copy (they can also be found on the charities commission website)

The final balances transferred to the Church Account were:

- £8117 general funds (includes SEC projects remaining balances)
- £2277 restricted funds "Baking Blokes" (this had been a historic grant from Tesco & permission has been given to re-allocate to warm spaces)
- £1000 restricted funds for the YMCA cookery lessons project.
- TOTAL £11394.

These have been allocated in the Church Accounts, and it is to be noted that the church will still have a solicitors bill to pay out of the general funds, for the work required in winding up the SEC. Anne Taylor

Volunteering

As a Church, we are a "Volunteer led" organization and as we interact with other local charities & community groups, this is very relevant.

Most of our volunteers are Church members but many are from the "wider community". People volunteer for many different reasons, but most because they want to "make a difference" to the local community and the many groups and events that are hosted at The Crossing definitely achieve that.

Most of the community groups that meet at The Crossing are entirely led by volunteers and many have included reports in this booklet.

We ask all our volunteers to "sign in" when they are attending The Crossing to volunteer in any capacity, this is predominantly for fire safety reasons (If you are not in the habit of doing this, please do)

One of our admin volunteers (Katherine) kindly transfers the hours onto a

spreadsheet and from that we can collate some statistics and answer the question "how many volunteers does it take to run a busy Church & Community Centre" Looking at these figures we have had at least 43 people regularly volunteering at The Crossing, giving an average of 325 hours per month in total (3900 hours for the year)– many are volunteering for around 20 hours per month, with a handful giving at least 50 hours per month.

These figures do not account for those who did not "sign in" or let us know how many hours that they have been working for the church when not in the building, admin etc. I estimate that if we accounted for these, then these figures would be almost doubled.

As you read through this booklet of reports, please know how valued all of the volunteers are, especially by the people who come along to all of our groups and events. None of it could happen without the whole "Crossing Community" working together to make it happen and the more of us who contribute with a small amount of time, the more that we will be able to achieve together.

So if you have not volunteered yet to take on a role, or help in whatever way you can, then please speak to one of the Church Council members to offer your help if you are able. *Anne Taylor*

5th Worksop (Methodist) Guides

Children's Bereavement Centre.



The Children's Bereavement Centre provides support for children from Bassetlaw at one of the most difficult times of their lives which is delivered by a team of professionals who are qualified to help with the grieving process brought on by the death or terminal illness diagnosis of a loved one. It is open to children aged 3 to 18 and offers a welcoming and safe

environment for them and their parents/carers which is thanks to the venue and facilities provided by The Crossing.

All the children accessing support have experienced trauma due to the death of someone important to them, often in problematic circumstances such as chronic illness, accident, murder, manslaughter, or suicide. The charity provides free specialist one-to-one support and has supported 107 children and young people in the past 12 months. The charity's interventions help bereaved families to cope and make a significant difference to immediate wellbeing and long-term recovery.

Children can adjust to their loss, reducing their risk of negative behaviour patterns and physical or mental health problems. They are able to grow up healthier and happier, going on to make a positive contribution to their communities and creating a bright future for themselves.

Our mission is to share the love of God and serve the local <u>community</u>



We seek to achieve this by:

- Offering a welcoming, caring place of worship, prayer and friendship
- Supporting the people of Worksop and district through a range of community events and activities

This cross is a visible symbol of our faith which can be seen on both the inside and the outside of our building. It tells the story at the heart of our identity. Internally it is the focal point of our worship and a reminder of God's love shining on us and through us. Externally it openly declares to the town of Worksop the faith which is at the centre of all that we do. The vertical line of the cross illustrates the relationship each one of us has with God. The horizontal piece represents our relationships with one another within the church and the wider community. The circle at the centre is where all of those relationships meet and resonate - the place where faith is put into action, and where it grows.

We give thanks for the ways in which we have been able to use our building as a town centre resource over the last sixteen years. In light of all that we have experienced through the Covid pandemic, and the economic hardships that we current witness, we are seeing new opportunities and challenges for the future of The Crossing.

We aim to be a focus for **spiritual, mental and physical well-being** in all that we do.

As we approach the next year we are ready for the next chapter of our story, with a team in place which includes:

- Our **Deacon** who brings a caring, community focused, spiritual approach to ministry.
- The **Visionaries** group who pray for our church and seek to discern ways in which we can worship and serve God through The Crossing.
- Our growing congregation.
- The small band of faithful **volunteers**, including the **Operations Team** which oversees the day to day running of a busy, multi purpose building.
- Support from the **Trinity Methodist Circuit, Sheffield Methodist District** and the **East Midlands Synod of The United Reformed Church**.
- We also have a wide range of **partnerships with community agencies** including Bassetlaw Community Voluntary Services, Bassetlaw Food Bank, YMCA, Methodist Homes for the Aged, Hope, and Bassetlaw Food Insecurity Network. Many of our members have trained to be Dementia Friends through the Alzheimer's Society.

Over the next eighteen months we are committed to developing:

- Worship with a creative mix of inclusive and accessible styles of services.
- A discipleship and spirituality programme with an emphasis on home groups and times of retreat. We will provide regular Morning Prayer sessions and a Prayer Space.

- A ministry in the town centre taking an active part in local events and working closely with our ecumenical and interfaith colleagues being attuned to the social, physical and spiritual needs of our community.
- **The café space** this can be used to meet needs within the local community such as serving meals within school holidays and providing a comfortable, warm space over the winter months in response to the cost of living crisis. The facilities are also available as a training base for cooking/nutrition support. We are a Fair Trade Church.
- Outreach to those who are retired by providing a range of events to which church members can confidently invite their friends, such as Messy Vintage. We will continue to strengthen our relationship with the residents who live in flats next to the church.
- A key role as a Dementia Friendly Church with special services, events, training and facilities. We are currently acting as ambassadors for this movement.
- The use of our premises as a Centre of Wellbeing building on the work already carried out with arts and craft groups, exercise classes, counselling services, mental and physical health support groups, Women's Wellbeing sessions and Blood Donors.
- Work with children and families nurturing our links with our Toddler Group and Uniformed Organisations, as well exploring connections with local schools. We also aim to provide a safe space for families to socialise at a Community Cinema project.
- The recruitment, training and encouragement of volunteers we will seek to find suitable roles for those who are able to support our welcome desk, back office administration, catering, gardening, and work with children, families and older adults.
- The aim to achieve and maintain Silver Eco Church status which will include the development of our church wildlife garden and community allotment.
- Inclusion we welcome refugees. The venue is registered for same sex marriage.
- An online presence through our website and our Facebook page. We will also share good news about the church and community via our magazine and the local press.

• A site which is in the cultural quarter of Worksop – the church hosts Concerts and a Model Transport Exhibition, as well as supporting the neighbouring Acorn Theatre.

To achieve this we will be applying for:

- Funding support for the appointment of a **Communities & Facilities Manager** to oversee the running of our building and the recruitment and training of volunteers. This will ease the burden felt by the current voluntary Operations Team and free those individuals to share in other ways in the mission and ministry of the church.
- Funding to **subsidise the community focused work** carried out in the building in partnership with other organisations.
